Meeting was called to order at 11:00AM.


- A short "Meet and Greet" took place.

Historical Moment in Time

"This motor cycle and side car were of special interest to me as it involved one of my Dad's favorite stories from WWII. Earl W Wanklin Jr. was part of 102nd Infantry division, the Ozark Division, and arrived in Europe in October 1944. After several months of combat, he was hit by a piece of US shrapnel. Here is the story. He and another guy were going after a German machine gun nest that had his men pinned down. Just as he was about to shoot the new Second Lieutenant got nervous and called in artillery and as he and his partner ran down the hill he was wounded. As he was recovering, he heard his outfit was moving up and he went AWOL from the hospital. When he returned to his outfit, he found his good friend, Wilhelm, and other Sergeants drinking. My Dad's return was cause to keep the party going. Soon after this a runner came around with a call for all Sergeants and Platoon leaders to report to HQ. The commanding officer stated that the Germans were falling back so fast and the US advance was also unknown. He wanted volunteers to go forward and locate the lines. As Wilhelm was quite drunk, he stood up and volunteered for the job. My Dad also said he would go along. The two Sergeants got 4 jeeps with 50 cal machine gun and loaded as many of their guys in to the jeeps with as much booze that then could carry. This was March 1945.

As they traveled down the road for some time, they stopped to check the map. As they studied the map, they discovered that they had run off it! As they were deciding what to do a German Armored Column came down the road. Wilhelm, who spoke German, walked out to the middle of the road and ordered the column to halt! And they did! A German Officer got out and walked up to Wilhelm and asked if the US soldiers were surrendering? Wilhelm said "NO" and asked if the Germans wanted to surrender. The German Officer said that the US soldiers were outnumbered and out gunned to which Wilhelm replied that he was commanding the lead point for column of Sherman's

tanks that were just 15 minutes behind them. The negotiations continued for a few more minutes and it was decided that if the US troop would surrender that would be released in the next town. The Germans knew that the war was over and the Officer said his men just wasted to go home. Also, the Germans knew that POW were shipped home and did not reenter into combat. My Dad and Wilhelm got into a trunk where they were greeted by an old Sergeant who was a WWI veteran. Wilhelm found out that he was leaving the column at the next town and that Wilhelm and my Dad should come with him. As the column slowed the three of them jumped out of the trunk and went down some street until they reached a Beer Garden. The old German stomped on the floor and called for the owner to come up. He shouted "the Americans are here". It turned out that the owned was his cousin. The old German Sergeant burned his uniform and got closes from his cousin. Needless to say, the drinking went on all afternoon.

After some time had passed, my Dad and Wilhelm decided that they should rejoined their troops. Well, the 82nd was in town and all their guys had been truck to the rear area. So, they went looking for transportation and found several abandon German vehicles and they were able to get a staff car running. As they started out and turn left, they broadsided a 2 Star Generals jeep. Luckily unoccupied! The General was chewing them out as they showed their shoulder patches showing him, they were not his guys but POW who were hiding in a cellar until the Germans left. They were told to get out of his sight! As they went back to look for another vehicle, they came upon a BMW 750cc motor cycle and side car. They loaded it up with as much gas as they could find and a supply of booze.

For the next two weeks they traveled across southern Germany and France stopping at farm houses trading booze for a meal and a barn to sleep in. As they stopped at US fuel depots a bottle of wine would buy them a full tank of gas along with their jerry can being filled. The trip ended at camp "Lucky Strike" which was Lahaver, France where all returning soldiers would embark for the trip home. Before entering the embarking area, they sold the motor cycle to two British PM's for 300 pounds and then as they walked to "Lucky Strike" they walked into their old outfit. It seems that they had been pulled out of the line and were being sent home. My Dad went over with two stripes on his sleeve and came home with five. He was, earlier, offered a battle field commission but he would be having to leave his troops so he declined. He was also offered as chance to go to West Point but as he was a new father, me, he went to college and became a high school math teacher. The model is a tribute to his memory and all those who served."

SAT, NOV 9 AT 12 PM Hidden Battleship USS NORTH CAROLINA Battleship · Wilmington, NC Price: \$50.00, 4 Hour behind the scenes tour.

For the explorer at heart, bring a friend and join us for a unique, behind-the-scenes tour of unrestored areas of the Battleship. The four-hour tour consists of small groups with guides. Guests explore the bow (officers' country, boatswain locker), third deck (Radio II, brig, after gyro, storage rooms, ammunition handling, Engineer's office), Engine room #1, superstructure (Captain's cabin, armored conning tower), after diesel, and climb inside the forward superstructure to the top of the ship. The Azalea Coast Radio Club will be in Radio II to explain their work on the ship's radio transmitters. It's the tour that brings out the "Indiana Jones" in all of us, without the snakes!

The program is for adults only (ages 16 and up) and limited to 40 participants. It is not appropriate for those who have difficulty climbing narrow ladders or over knee-high hatches. Wear warm, comfortable, washable clothing, sturdy, rubber-soled shoes and bring a camera!

Registration and payment are due Thursday before the event.

History

When the keel of NORTH CAROLINA was laid in October of 1937 at the New York Navy Yard, Brooklyn, New York, she was the first battleship to be constructed in sixteen years. She became the first of ten fast battleships to join American fleet in World War II. NORTH CAROLINA (BB 55) and her sister ship, WASHINGTON (BB 56), comprised the NORTH CAROLINA Class. Following them were the SOUTH DAKOTA Class – SOUTH DAKOTA (BB 57), INDIANA (BB 58), MASSACHUSETTS (BB 59), and ALABAMA (BB 60) – and the IOWA Class – IOWA (BB 61), NEW JERSEY (BB 62), MISSOURI (BB 63), and WISCONSIN (BB 64).

At the time of her commissioning on 9 April 1941, she was considered the world's greatest sea weapon. Armed with nine 16-inch/45 caliber guns in three turrets and twenty 5-inch/38 caliber guns in ten twin mounts, NORTH CAROLINA proved a formidable weapons platform. Her wartime complement consisted of 144 commissioned officers and 2,195 enlisted men, including 86 Marines.

During World War II, NORTH CAROLINA participated in every major naval offensive in the Pacific area of operations and earned 15 battle stars.

In the Battle of the Eastern Solomons in August of 1942, the Battleship's anti-aircraft barrage helped save the carrier ENTERPRISE, thereby establishing the primary role of the fast battleship as protector of aircraft carriers. One of her Kingfisher pilots performed heroically during the strike on Truk when she rescued ten downed Navy aviators on 30 April 1944. In all, NORTH CAROLINA carried out nine shore bombardments, sank an enemy troopship, destroyed at least 24 enemy aircraft, and assisted in shooting down many more.

Her anti-aircraft guns helped halt or frustrate scores of attacks on aircraft carriers. She steamed over 300,000 miles. Although Japanese radio announcements claimed six times that NORTH CAROLINA had been sunk, she survived many close calls and near misses with one hit when a Japanese torpedo slammed into the Battleship's hull on 15 September 1942. A quick response on the part of the crew allowed the mighty ship to keep up with the fleet. By war's end, the Ship lost only ten men in action and had 67 wounded.

After serving as a training vessel for midshipmen, NORTH CAROLINA was decommissioned 27 June 1947 and placed in the Inactive Reserve Fleet in Bayonne, New Jersey, for the next 14 years. In 1958 the announcement of her impending scrapping led to a statewide campaign by citizens of North Carolina to save the ship from the scrappers torches and bring her back to her home state. The Save Our Ship (SOS) campaign was successful and the Battleship arrived in her

current berth on 2 October 1961. She was dedicated on 29 April 1962 as the State's memorial to its World War II veterans and the 11,000 North Carolinians who died during the war.




